In response to the growing need of our neighbors and partners throughout Mercer County, Mercer Street Friends Food Bank has a new address! Located at 3 Graphics Drive in Ewing, the warehouse provides 42,000 square feet of space to better store and distribute food to our 100+ pantry partners.

The move-in process has been overseen by our COO and Food Bank Director, James "Butter" Allen, who identified this opportunity through his friendships at TCNJ (read the full article below). We couldn't be more excited about the new chapter for Mercer Street Friends Food Bank! Honoring a Champion in the Fight Against FOOD INSECURITY

Over 300 guests joined us on June 10, 2024 for our Fourth Annual Leadership Awards Celebration, as we honored New Jersey Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin with the 2024 Humanitarian Award. Special guest Claire Babineaux-Fontenot, CEO of Feeding America, presented Speaker Coughlin with the Award.

Throughout his tenure in state leadership, Speaker Coughlin has been dedicated to eradicating food insecurity. He has helped to raise the monthly minimum SNAP benefit from \$50 to \$95, expand free school lunch opportunities for children, increase aid to food banks by 800%, and create New Jersey's Office of Food Security Advocate, the first in the nation. With the support of other community leaders and organizations, Coughlin has stated he hopes to eliminate hunger in New Jersey by 2030.

The event also offered guests a first glimpse at our new food bank warehouse, which was incredibly transformed by our warehouse team into an elegant dining space. Thank you to our event sponsors and all supporters who made this event possible.

FUN IN THE SUN

for Community School Students

Summer Bridge 2024, an extension of Mercer Street Friends' Community Schools initiative within the Trenton School District, offered 200 elementary and middle school students a vibrant and engaging summer!

This program "bridges" the gap between the end of the school year and the start of the next one with grade-specific lessons in math, reading, and SEL (social emotional learning) to keep our students' minds sharp. Students also explore individual interests with a variety of afternoon enrichment activities and class trips read on for highlights from our best summer ever!





At Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Middle School, students loved reading the coming-of-age classic "Holes" by Louis Sachar, and constructing cardboard structures that must be wind-resistant. Enrichment programs included drumming, leadership, comic books, arts/sports, gardening, and video production, and students visited BAPS Shri Swaminarayan Mandir in Robbinsville and the Statue of Liberty.



B.C. Gregory Elementary School students advanced their reading and math skills with the help of interventionists, and took trips to the Trenton Thunder, Shady Brook Farm, and Rockville Climbing Center.



Luis Muñoz-Rivera Elementary School students explored their communities and celebrated diversity. In between personalized math and reading lessons, students enjoyed SEL lessons from Kidsbridge and rehearsed their cumulative dramatic performance.

SUPPORTING MERCER COUNTY Families

We know strong families make strong communities - so we proudly provide services to support the physical, financial, social/emotional, and developmental needs of local families. Education is at the heart of Mercer Street Friends' work, and our adult education is a critical component of our Family Services program, offering individuals seeking to complete their high school education an opportunity to do so.

From Adult Education to Associate Degree

For LaBella Barnes, earning her degree is a family affair. On her mind are both family members who have passed away, and those whose young lives have just begun.

"My nephew Michael and I promised each other we'd get our high school diplomas," the Ewing resident says. Together, they took advantage of Mercer Street Friends' adult basic education tutoring and services. When Michael sadly died in 2019, LaBella knew she had to keep going and earn her diploma to honor his memory.

"The Mercer Street Friends team is amazing," she says. "Michelle and Mr. Richard were so helpful. They helped get me to the point where I could earn my high school diploma and think about next steps."

At 49, LaBella earned her high school diploma - and family members, including her son Antwone, pushed her to keep going. But in 2022, tragedy struck again - Antwone passed away, and LaBella knew she had to follow the advice he had always given her. In September of that year, she enrolled at Thomas Edison State University (TESU).

"Antwone was always so proud when I was pursuing my education," she says. "And he was a great father – now that I'm helping to take care of his three daughters, I want to show them that their grandmother can go to college and get a degree."

This fall, LaBella graduates from TESU with an associate degree, and she just began her first semester with Rutgers University, where she will pursue her bachelor's degree in biology.

LaBella is a prime example of the difference Mercer Street Friends Adult Education can make, and we couldn't be prouder of how far she has come. Congratulations on your success LaBella!

BUILDING A STRONG FOUNDATION IN EDUCATION

Mercer Street Friends offers high-quality, no-cost preschool services for children ages 3-5, helping them adjust to an educational setting and prepare for a successful transition to kindergarten. Our certified teachers and teacher assistants use the Creative Curriculum to build essential academic skills while helping students grow socially and emotionally, too!

This summer our preschoolers enjoyed a sixweek camp that helped advance their writing and literacy levels. Campers practiced writing their names and learned in small groups. Combined with summer activities like water play and dance, the camp served as the perfect transition between school years, said Preschool Director Lisa Banks

This fall, enrollment at the Preschool remains at 100%, with 90 children ready to learn. Meanwhile, 53 children just transitioned out of the Preschool program - they are academically and socially ready to take on kindergarten!

"We provide a loving, caring, safe environment for all children who enter our doors. We teach them, prepare them socially and emotionally, and make sure they have well-balanced meals - all of this allows our students to be themselves as they have fun while learning."

"One key lesson from my internship is that while individual passion can spark change locally, lasting, widespread improvement requires a collective effort," she wrote.
